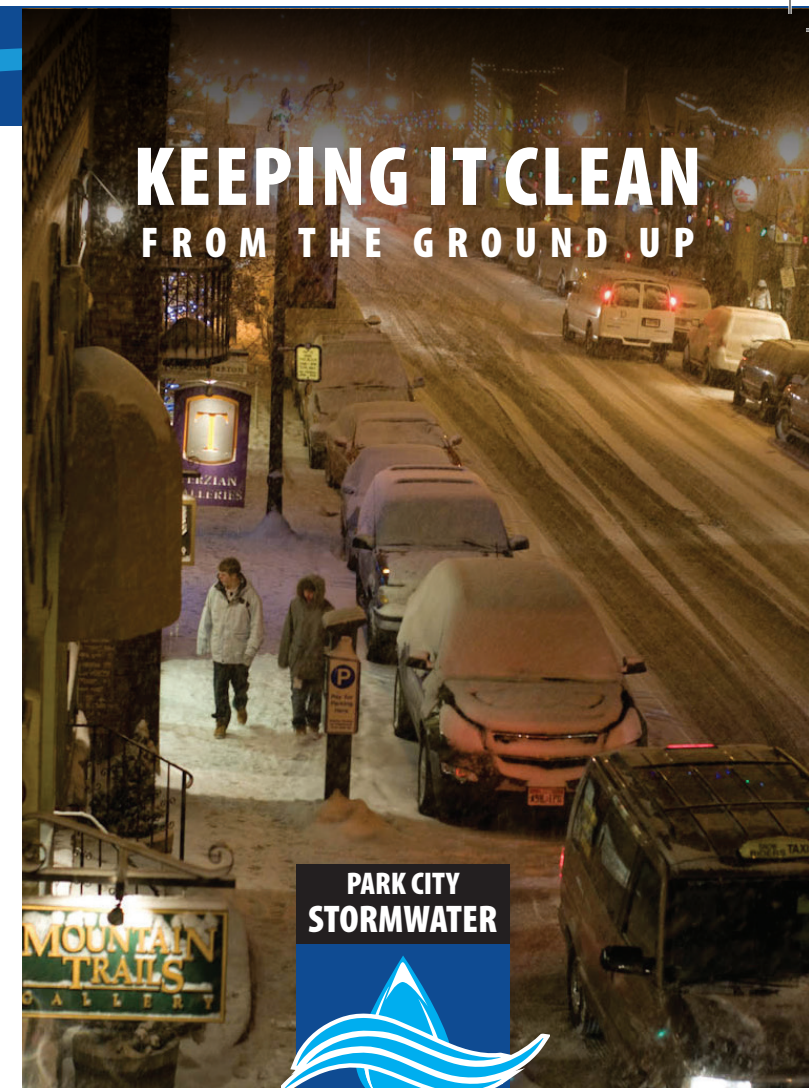

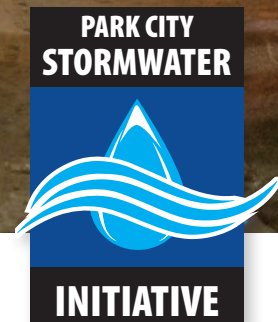

DRIVING STORMWATER PRESERVATION EFFORTS

Park City is focused on preserving and enhancing the natural environment by managing stormwater quality and quantity to keep waterways clean, ecosystems sustainable, and reduce flooding. Stormwater that is not managed runs across manmade surfaces and gathers pollutants. The water is never treated, therefore, pollutants are carried into McLeod and Silver Creeks — important wildlife habitats, and recreational and culinary water resources — that flow into the Great Salt Lake.

Vehicles contribute to water pollution in several ways:



Exhaust particles and car fluids land on roadways and are washed into our creeks. Also, car parts that are designed to wear

down with use, such as tires and brake pads, leave toxic residue on the roadway and pollute stormwater when it rains or snows.

EASY SOLUTIONS

Following are several ways you can help reduce stormwater pollution in your daily life to ensure a safe and beautiful Park City.



- Prevent dirty water from entering the storm drain by washing vehicles at a commercial car wash or on the lawn with biodegradable soap that will not harm grass or landscaping.

- Store toxic products and fluids in cabinets or sheds.

- Take used motor oil and antifreeze to a recycling center or hazardous waste facility.

- Place used oil in a clean, leak-proof container with a tight-fitting cap.

- Inspect and maintain vehicles to prevent leaks.



- Do not use containers that were previously used for gasoline, antifreeze, paint, thinners, solvents or bleach.



- Drain used oil filters then throw them away in the household trash.

- Do not mix used oil with water, gasoline, antifreeze, solvents or any other substances. Only oil can be recycled. Placing other substances in Used Oil Recycling is dangerous and illegal.

- Clean up spills with kitty litter or absorbent material. Dispose of cleanup as hazardous waste.

- Reduce automotive emissions through regular maintenance and by limiting vehicle usage.
