NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

311 Woodside is a T/L cottage that has been modified significantly in recent years. The T/L cottage, also known as a cross-wing, is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era. The site was excavated and the house lifted for a basement level addition as well as an addition to the rear. Many material changes were made to the house leading up to 1995, but the recent renovation has served to restore many of the elements that were removed or covered. The cross gable roof is sheathed with composition shingles. The walls of the original house are clad with drop-novelty siding that appears to be newer, while the basement level addition is clad with a stone veneer. The windows are one-over-one double hung sash type windows, with a pair present in the front gable end, one of either side of the cross-wing and one more of the same type on the section of the stem wing extending beyond the cross-wing. The porch is covered by a hip roof extension of the main roof, which is supported by square wood posts. The porch appears to have been rebuilt. A long stair leads from the porch down to the ground level. Left of the stair is a

series of terraces created by railroad tie retaining walls. Right of the stair is a concrete pad used as a parking area. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

The house at 311 Woodside does not appear on the 1889 Sanborn Insurance Map, but does appear on the 1900 map. It was under the ownership of the Park City Townsite Company at this time, but in 1901 was sold to Ada Leuzi. No information could be found on her, and the 1900 census did not include house addresses, so it in unknown who lived in the house during these times. The house did undergo a significant rear addition at between 1900 and 1907, presumably under her direction. The property went to a financial institution in 1923 and then to H.O. Tuttle in 1923. The house does not shown up on the 1920 census, indicating that it was vacant at that time.

Harold Tuttle married Nellie Lindstrom of Park City in 1920, and they lived in her hometown for several years until eventually moving to Salt Lake. They sold the house to Emily Kemp, who later transferred the ownership to her husband Joseph. Joseph and Emily were both born in England and emigrated to the U.S. in 1866. Joseph worked in the mines of Park City. They sold the house to George W. Garns in 1928.

George Garns lived in the house during the 1930 census with his wife Erminnie, their two children, and his brother Samuel. George grew up in Park City, and was a foreman for a mine. He lived there during the 1940 census as well, though it was only he and his wife in the house at that point. He retired in 1945 due to failing health and moved to California, where he died in 1946.

Ernest Lingman was the next owner of the house, and lived there with his wife Martha and their ten children. He was born in Salt Lake City, as was his wife, and worked as a "Lunch Room Prop." He only owned the property for a short time before selling it to Earl La Var James and his wife.

The property traded hands several more times since the historic period, and is currently owned by Arthur and Pam Bingham.









Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 311 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)



Geo. W. Garns Dies In El Segundo, Cal.

After a lingering illness George W. Garns, for many years a resident of this city, passed to his final rest at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, November 14 at the home of his daughter in El Segundo, California.

Mr. Garns was born in Mendon, Utah, September 18, 1880, and was married to Erminnia Roach April 10, 1904. Most of his life was spent in or around Park City. Except for two separated periods when he was foreman of the Salt Lake Ico company for thirteen years and two years when he and his brother operated an ice plant in Idaho Falls, Idaho. He followed the occupation of mining here. In the years 1904 and 1905 he worked at the Silver King Coalition and the remainder of his mining career was followed at the Park Utah Consolidated Mines company, where he became shift boss, foreman, and assistant superintendent.

Mr. Garns retired in October 1945, because of ill health and moved to Los Angeles, California, where his health failed steadily until his death.

Services were held at the L. D. S. chapel in Inglewood, California, with interment in the Inglewood Park cemetery.

He is survived by the following: His wife, Erminnie Garns; two sons, Wm. G. Garns, Bell Gardens, California; Paul L. Garns, Los Angeles; one daughter, Mrs. V. L. McCarthy, El Segundo, California; one brother, Martin Garns, Idaho Falis, Idaho; five sisters, Della Bates, Idaho Falis; Jane Garns and Zotia Rynearson of Los Angeles; Lillian Anderson, Portland, Oregon; and Cecelia Pfister, Santa Barbara, California.
