NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

909 Woodside is a side passage type house that has been changed significantly over time. While the side passage is not one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era, it was common during that time period. The basic form of the house remains, but the porch has been reduced from a full width porch shown in the Sanborn maps to the narrow porch seen today. The gable roof with the shed extension is sheathed with standing seam metal and the hipped porch roof is sheathed with composition shingles. The walls are clad with aluminum siding and have board-and-batten wood siding in the gable and the porch area. The windows have also been altered, with a single-pane casement window replacing a multipane window sitting in the front gable end in the c. 1968 photo. A sliding window sits in the upper gable. The door is a wood frame and panel door with a half-round upper light. The porch roof is supported by open

metal supports. A concrete retaining wall lines the sidewalk. Although the form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house was built before the drawing of the 1889 Sanborn Insurance map, which makes it difficult to determine exactly when it was built. It was owned by either the Park City Townsite Corporation or Violet Arthur at the time of construction. A Violet Arthur lived in Park City in 1890, and her husband John was a veteran. No other information could be found on her. The next owner of the house was John Rogers, who purchased it in 1895. It is assumed that he died, because the next transaction is in his wife Magaretta's name. The only reference that could be found to her was in the 1900 census, where it shows that she was living in Park City with her two children. She sold the house in 1896 to Charles Paull.

Charles Paull died just four years later in 1900. His estate was left to Minerva Paull, but it is unknown how they were related to each other. After that time the property becomes difficult to follow because of a missing page in the recorder book (book 2, page 285). The house does not appear again until 1952. However, the available censuses provide information on the property. On the 1910 census, a house address 907 Woodside is noted, which may be this house, as that address did not exist on the 1907 Sanborn map. At that time it was rented by a Curtis Baldwin, his wife Pearl and their daughter. Curtis worked as a machinist for a mine. No other records were found on their family.

On the 1920 census, it states that the house was owned and occupied by William and Rachel Dennison, William worked as a carpenter in the town. He was in the army and his term of service expired while he was stationed in Park City. He then got married there and remained in the city for the rest of his life. William died in 1928, and his wife moved to Salt Lake thereafter.

It states on the 1930 census that the house was owned by Floyd Yates, who lived at the house with his wife Susan, and their two daughters. Floyd was a blacksmith who worked for a mine. No other information could be found on them or their family. The 1940 census shows that it was rented by Esther Greenwood in that year, but it is unknown who owned it at that time.

The house has changed hands many times since the historic period and is currently owned by Cyndi Schwandt.








Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 909 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)


