NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

1120 Woodside is a hall-parlor type house that has undergone many modifications. The hall-parlor is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era, and is the earliest of those three, occurring mostly during the beginning of that time period. Though the house has not been added to, the front porch was enclosed by 1949 and there have also been several material alterations. The side gable roof is sheathed with standing seam metal, replacing the composition shingles. The walls are clad with a narrow wood lap siding. The enclosed front porch is currently clad with the same material as the rest of the house. Two large sliding windows are arranged symmetrically on the front façade. The door is not located on the primary façade, but on the south side of the enclosed porch, and is a wood six panel door. There is a gravel

driveway to the south of the house. Although the form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house was likely built while the property was under the ownership of W.A. McEnery, who received the property in 1905. William McEnery was married to Henrietta McEnery, who was previously married to David McLaughlin of the Park City Townsite Corporation. It is possible that she had inherited some of her husband's properties after his death, this being one of them. The title history becomes muddled at this point, but information from the censuses reveals more of the history of the house.

The 1910 census shows that the house was owned and occupied by Joseph Neilson and his wife Agnes. Both of them were from Denmark and emigrated to the U.S. in 1867 and 1874 respectively. Joseph worked as a miner. He died in 1912, and it is not known what happened regarding the ownership of the property at that point.

The 1920 census shows that the property was owned and occupied by Charles Johnson and his wife Agnes, who is not the same Agnes that was married to Joseph Neilson. Charles Johnson was a miner, and appears on the title history, but not until 1931. He and his wife continued to live in the house at the time of the 1940 census, which states that they owned the house at that time as well. The title history disagrees, showing that the house was sold to S.C. hatch in 1931, and then Stanley Parrish in 1935. No information could be found regarding these men, and it is unclear exactly what happened regarding the history of ownership of this house. It is currently owned by Norma and Ricky Sanders.






