NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

243 McHenry is a hall-parlor type with minimal modifications. The hall-parlor type was one of the main three types of house built during the historic Park City mining era, and was the earliest of those three, occurring most commonly in the beginning of that period. The gable roof is sheathed in corrugated metal and has a masonry

chimney to one side. Drop wood siding clads the entire house. There is a small low-pitched gable addition on the east façade and is clad and sheathed in the same materials as the rest of the house. On the front façade is a fixed casement window that is a later addition to the home, judging by differences in the siding above it. Other windows noted on other historical forms are not visible in available photos. The foundation is only wood sills with no other material present. A small gable roofed garage structure is present at the front of the property clad in vertical board siding, and sheathed with asphalt shingles. A fence and gate made of old skis surrounds the yard. The house is in slight disrepair, but its historical value has been maintained. The garage outbuilding appears to be historic based on materials and design and should be treated as a contributing structure. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value

Narrative Statement of Significance:

Little is known about the early history of this house, which was built between the 1907 and 1929 Sanborn maps of Park City. The first verified ownership transaction was a sale in November 1925 from D.L.H.D. Grover to Julie Kretschmer. Grover (sometimes spelled "De Grover") was a Chinese native who bought and sold a large amount of rental properties in Park City, dying with over seventy-five Park City properties that were passed on to his son Joe Grover. He was unlikely to live in this house, therefore, and it was probably rented to a miner. Nothing is known about Julie Kretschmer.

Patrick Fegan bought the house in 1927 and lived there until his death in 1965. Pat was born in Hilltown, County Down, Ireland, on June 9, 1898. He moved to Park City in 1921, where he married Marian Frances Murphy (b. c.1907 in Ireland) on August 4, 1925. Pat was a miner for many years in the United Park City Mines, later working as an electrician for that company. Preceded in death by Marian, Pat died on December 11, 1965.

Pat and Marian's daughter Patricia Ann "Patsy" Dennis inherited the property upon Pat's death. She owned it with husband Richard until her death in 1985. Richard Dennis is still a part-owner of the property, although it is unclear if he lives in the house






243 McHenry Street. West elevation. November 2013.




243 McHenry Street. Northwest oblique. November 2013.
