NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

(Briefly describe the property and its setting. 323 Ontario is a cross-wing type house, which has not undergone many material or formal changes. The cross-wing, also known as a T/L cottage, is one of the three main types of houses built during the historic Park City mining era. The main façade of the house is facing away from the street and is reached by a stair leading up to the sidewalk. The cross gabled roof is sheathed with standing seam metal, a change from the shingle material shown in the c. 1970 photo. The house is clad with drop-novelty wood siding. The windows on the front façade are all the one-over-one double hung sash type, with a pair in the front gable end and a pair under the porch. Another pair of

the same window type is seen on the stem wing façade. These windows replace the large fixed pane windows shown in the 1970s photo. The windows all have decorative wood trim though it is not original. The porch is inset, and covered by a shed roof that continues south over part of the house. Additions were made in the rear of the house, sometime between the drawing of the 1941 Sanborn map and the 1949 tax card. The site slopes down very steeply, and the top of the roof is below the grade of Ontario Avenue. The foundation is noted as being concrete in the 1968 tax card, but it is not visible in any images and remains unverified. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

(Briefly describe those characteristics by which this property may be considered historically significant.)

This house was built sometime between 1900 and 1907, judging from the Sanborn Insurance maps from those years. A dwelling existed on this lot on the previous Sanborn maps, but it is different enough from the later structure that it was almost certainly demolished to make room for the later building. A previous historic site form indicates that the house may have been built around 1902, from information acquired from the Summit County Recorder. The owner of the house at that time would have been John H. Bishop.

John H. Bishop appears on the 1900 census, living on Norfolk Avenue at that time with his wife Bessie, and their four children. He was born in Michigan, and Bessie was born in England, and immigrated to the U.S. in 1884. No other information could be found on him or his family. He sold the house in 1905 to Francis Cargeeg.

Francis Cargeeg appears on the 1900 census for Park City, living on Ontario Avenue with his wife Elizabeth at that time. They were both born in England, and immigrated to the U.S. in 1884. Francis, or Frank, worked as a miner, and worked in many of the camps. It is unknown how many children they had, but the next owner of the house was Mary Cargeeg Nancarrow, their daughter.

Mary was married to George Nancarrow in 1894 in Park City. She and her husband lived in this house for many years, and appear on the 1920 census at this location, at which time they had five children living with them. George and Mary were both born in England, and immigrated to the U.S. in 1887 and 1884 respectively. George worked as a miner and also a general laborer for the city. He died in 1927 following an illness, but Mary continued to live in the house, and is shown on both the 1930 and 1940 censuses. The Nancarrow family continued to own the house until 1990, and it is currently owned by Patrick and Robert Carnahan.








323 Ontario Avenue. Northwest oblique. November 2013.




323 Ontario Avenue. Southwest oblique. November 2013.




323 Ontario Avenue. Northeast oblique. November 2013.

Another old tirus resident and miner of Park City was summoned to his final rest yesterday moraling. This time the grim reaper claimed Francis Cargeog, who for upward of twenty-three years has been a famillar figure in our midst, during all of that time working at different miners in the camp. He was one of the first to work on the Mayflower, which later developed into the big Silver King Contition, and for years he was at the Ontario, Anchor and other properties of the camp. He was an exceptionally good miner, a good citizen and a good man. He goes to his reward beloved by those who knew him bost and respected by all. To bis aged wife, his only surviving daughter, and other mear relatives, sincere sympathy is extended in their great bereavement and sorrow. He was a devoted husband, and kind father.

Francis Cargeeg was born in Madron Churchtown, Cornwall, England, on the 4th of April, 1842, making him seventy-two years of age at the time of his death. He came to America thirty-five years ago, living in Michigan and Colorado untt 1880 when he came to Park City residing here steadily since that time. He is survived by a widow and one daughter, Mrs. Mary Nancarrow, and seventeen grandchild-




