NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

The house at 405 Ontario does not closely resemble any of the main types of house built during the historic Park City mining era. Built c. 1930, it has been altered significantly. The roof is partially a hip roof, and partially a gable roof, which is an unusual combination. It is sheathed with standing seam metal, which replaced the shingle material shown in the c. 1940 tax photo. The house is clad with drop-novelty wood siding, including the lower addition. A paired casement window is in the gable facing the road, a fixed casement on the south façade and two large vertically oriented fixed or casement windows at the basement level on the primary façade. A full width covered porch is on the primary façade and has square wood posts and a simple wood balustrade between. The house was raised and had a basement level constructed between 1995 and 2006. A concrete foundation is visible at the basement level. The site is steeply sloped and is below the road grade. The house is reached via Shorty's Stairs which leads to the porch stairs. Although the form remains legible, the cumulative formal and material changes have diminished its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

(Briefly describe those characteristics by which this property may be considered historically significant.)

Though a previous historic site form has stated that the house was built in 1904, it does not appear on a Sanborn map until 1941. It also does not appear on a census until 1930. Based on that evidence, it is assumed that this house was built sometime between the 1929 Sanborn Insurance map and the 1930 census.

The owner of the house at the time that it was constructed was Emma Johnson. She appears on the 1930 census for Park City, living on Marsac Avenue with her husband Ancil. It seems they used the house as an income property; as it was being rented at the time of that census by two separate families, Lawrence and Anna Robinson, and William and Constance Overly. The house was still being rented out during the 1940 census, and was occupied at that time by Cecil and Mildred Wheeler. Emma Johnson sold the house in 1941 to J.W. Broadwater.

No evidence of a J.W. Broadwater living in Park City could be found. The property has been bought and sold several times since then, and is currently owned by lan R. Kinkaid.





405 Ontario Avenue. Southwest oblique. November 2013.




405 Ontario Avenue. Southeast oblique. November 2013.

Emma Johnson

Emma E. Johnson, 83, a long time resident of Park City passed to her final restFeb.14, 1973 in Santa Monica, Calif. She was born Oct. 11, 1889.

Mrs. Johnson came to Park City from Sweden in 1904 at the age of 15. Some years later she was married to Ancil Tobias Johnson. There were four children born of this marriage, one died at birth, and the other three Ancil T. (Ted), Wesley and Mary Ellen grew up and finished high school in Park City.

The children moved to Santa Monica, Calif. to further their education and in 1942, Mrs. Johnson joined them.

Shortly after coming to Santa Monica, she was employed by the Santa Monica School district as matron in the schools and served in this position for 25 years until she reached the mandatory age of retirement. At this time she was 70 years old.

Mrs. Johnson is survived by her son Ancil T. Johnson of Seattle, Wash.; and Mrs. Glenn Young of Santa Monica, Calif. She had 9 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren at the time of her death.

Funeral services were held on February 20, 1973 at the Santa Monica First Ward of the LDS Church with interment in the Woodlawn Cemetery in Santa-Monica, Calif.
