NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

(Briefly describe the property and its setting. Include a verbal description of the location; a general description of the property including the overall shape, number of stories, architectural style, materials, shape of roof; identify and describe any associated structures; identify any known exterior additions and/or alterations.)

The house at 575 Park Avenue was originally a cross-wing type house that has had several rear additions. The cross-wing, also known as a T/L cottage, is one of the three main house types built during the historic Park City mining era. There is a large two-story addition that has been built on the rear of the house, and is visible behind the original house. The bay window on the front facing gable seems to have gone through several periods of removal and rebuilding, according to tax photos and Sanborn maps; the current bay has been present since at least 1995. The gabled portions of the roof are sheathed with composition shingles, and the shed roof portions over the covered porch are sheathed with standing seam metal. The roof of the front window bay is also sheathed with metal. It is unclear what the roofing material of the shed dormers on the rear addition is, but it is assumed to be

composition shingles. The house is clad with drop-novelty wood siding, which may have been underneath the asbestos shingles mentioned in the 1978 National Register nomination. The windows are primarily two-over-two double hung sash windows, with three of that type in the bay window, one placed by the door, and one on the other side of the house. The door is a wood frame and panel door with a two-by-two upper light. A stone retaining wall starts and the driveway and follows the sidewalk as the road slopes downward. The overall form and materiality of the original house are still legible, though some may be restorations, and the house retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house appears on the 1889 Sanborn Insurance map, but a large addition took place between then and 1900, as the next Sanborn map shows a much larger rear area than before. The original house was likely built around 1883, judging from when a mortgage was taken out on the property. The house was owned by Luna Bouman at that time.

Luna Bouman, or Bowman, appears on the 1880 census. She lived with her husband Brigham and his younger brother Heber. Brigham was a barkeeper in town, but nothing else is known of them. They sold the house in 1885 to Nathan White. No information could be found on him except that he sold the house in 1885 to Edward Ferry.

Edward Ferry was a partner in the Park City Townsite Corporation, and it is possible that this house was used to house workers during that company's period of ownership. The next owner of the property was Henry Shields, who purchased it in 1913.

Henry Shields was a prominent layer in the Park City area during this time. He was also involved in mining activity, and had lived in Park City since 1879. He was a partner with W.I. Snyder, another attorney and prominent citizen of Park City. He served as a judge for Park City. He and his wife Aramintha had three children. They are noted as on Park Avenue during the 1900 census, but due to the lack of addresses on that census, it is not known if it was this house they lived in. The property eventually transferred to their daughter Catherine.

Catherine sold the house in 1920 to Richard Verran. He lived in a house on Park Avenue during the 1920 census, though the address he lived at was not recorded, so it is unknown if it was this house. He lived there with his wife Theresa and their two children. He worked as a salesman at a men's furnishing store. He sold the house to James Cunningham in 1929.

James Cunningham lived in this house with his wife Sarah during both the 1930 and 1940 censuses. Both James and Sarah were from Northern Ireland, and immigrated to the U.S. in 1908 and 1922, respectively. James worked as a carpenter for the Silver King Coalition Mines Company. He also was a veteran of WWI. They owned the house until 1949; it is currently owned by Fairy Isles Limited Company.





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

Ho married Sarah Cunningham in Ogden January 2, 1924.


He was a veteran of World War I, a member of Frank E. Peterson post of the American Legion, Park City, and a member of the Catholic church.



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

Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

One-story frame home with a gable roof; asbestos shake siding. Tax records indicate that a bay window existed, but his been removed.

Sanborn Maps showed the bay window in 1889 and 1900, but not in 1907. The s speculation is that the building could have been remodeled after 1907 to include the bay window, then altered again; thus, its removal. Or possibly, the present structure was built between 1900 and 1907.



The building represents a period-type dwelling and also illustrates the type of remodeling done on early Park City homes.

This property passed into the hands of Edward P. Ferry, prominent mining entrepreneur, in 1885, then to David C. McLaughlin (Henrietta M. McLaughlin ,1897). After a series of tax sales property went to Henry Shields (See SU-10-109), pioneer attorney and mining man of Park City. Other transactions followed to R.C. Verran, 1920; James Cunningham, 1929; and W. H. Howland, 1936.

One owner, James Cunningham, was born in 1887 at Lurganeagh, County Down, Ireland. He arrived in Park City in about 1906 and worked as a carpenter for the Silver King Coalintion Mining Co. He died in 1950.
