### NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

811 Park is a pyramid type house that recently underwent renovation. The pyramid house is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era and, of those three, was the most recent occurring mostly at the end of that time period. The truncated hipped roof has a steep pitch, and is sheathed with composition shingles. The walls are clad with drop novelty siding. The windows are all in sets of three, with a large pane in the center, flanked by two narrow panes. There is a set of these windows on either side of the central door. The door is a simple wood frame and panel door with an upper light. The porch is covered by a hipped roof that is supported by lathe turned posts with a simple railing running between the posts. The foundation is concrete with a brick facing, shown on the lower level. A concrete retaining wall runs through the yard and concrete steps lead to the porch from the sidewalk. No pictures of the house prior to rehabilitation are available, therefore, it is unknown exactly what aspects of the house were altered. The current house matches the description on the National Register nomination form and it appears to be the same as what is shown on the Sanborn insurance maps. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

(Briefly describe those characteristics by which this property may be considered historically significant.)

This house was built between 1889 and 1900, judging from the Sanborn Insurance maps from those years. It is likely that the house was built while the property was under the ownership of Edwin Kimball, a stagecoach entrepreneur. He gave it to his sons, who had formed the Kimball Investment Company, in 1918. They owned several properties in town, including their livery stable, which was located where the Kimball Arts Center is now.

The property went up for a tax sale, and was purchased in 1928 by J.E. Nelson. Joseph Nelson appears on the 1920 census for Park City, at which time he was living with his wife Sarah and their two children in a different house on Park Avenue. He worked as a salesman for a grocery store. He had also worked as an operator for the railroad at one point. The property was transferred to his wife. She appears on the 1930 census, living in this house without her husband, though the census states that she was still married. Her son Sumner still lived with her at that time.

The 1940 census shows that the house was owned and occupied by V.C. McBride at that time, though the title history states that he did not own the house until 1941. He worked as a millman for a mining company, and lived in the house with his wife Agnes and their three children. The property stayed in their family for several years, but is currently owned by Lawrence Brown.














811 Park Avenue, Park City, Summit County, Utah Intensive Level Survey—Sanborn Map history

This dwelling is a later built home, @1914, exhibiting some of the basic elements found in other mining town dwellings, frame construction, hip roof, and porch; and in general contributes to the Park City residential area.

The property is part of that described in SU-10-593, and was difficult to trace. Beginning as part of the holdings of David C. Mclaughlin, the land underwent numerous changes in ownership, eventually going from Muriel Ann Walker to Agnes E. Mathews Mc-Bride in a Quick Claim Deed in 1963.


