NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

1141 Park is a pyramid house that has undergone minor changes. The pyramid house is one of the three main house types built during the historic Park City mining era, and is the most recent of those three, occurring mostly towards the end of that period. There is evidence of an addition on the rear corner of the house on the tax cards, but it is unobtrusive and does not affect the original character of the building. The hipped roof is sheathed with composition shingles and a brick chimney can be seen near the peak. The walls are clad with drop-novelty wood siding. The windows are mostly grouped fixed pane windows; on the frontmost part of the house a large pane is flanked by two narrow panes and a similar window is next to the door in the porch area. Windows on the other façades are grouped. There is a wood screen door in front of the main door, obscuring the main door so its type cannot be verified. The porch is inset into the corner of the house, and wraps around to the side of the house, an

aspect uncommon among pyramid houses in the area. The porch is supported by square wood posts that taper toward the top. A small garage is located west of the house. The concrete foundation is visible below the siding. The yard is fenced in by a decorative metal fence with a gate to enter the yard. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

This house appears to be on the 1889 Sanborn map, though it is only partially visible. However, the location of the structure, its form, and also the building to the rear of the house make it seem very likely that it is in fact this house. The owner of the property at the time of construction was Cornelius Cottrell.

The only information that could be found on Cornelius Cottrell was that he was married on March 31, 1887, to Annie Keith. It is unknown if they ever lived in this house. It was sold in 1891 to Richard Hales.

Richard Hales appears on the 1900 census, living in a house on Daly Avenue with his wife Lizzie, or Eliza, and their son. At that time he worked as a mill hand for a concentrating mill, but he was later superintendent of the Ontario mill, then of the Park Utah and Daly Judge mills. He died in 1942. He and his wife lived in a different house on Park Avenue, and it is unknown if they ever lived in this house. They sold it to Lloyd Stanley in 1925.

Lloyd Stanley appears on the 1930 census, living in this house with his wife Hannah and their three children. He worked as a laborer for a mine, and also as a custodian for the school district. They owned the house until 1952, though it does not appear on the 1940 census, indicating that it was vacant at that time. The house is currently owned by Kathryn Lenton.





R. F. Hales Dies After Two Years Illness

After failing health for two years, Mr. Richard P. Hales passed into his final sleep at the Miners Hospital last Tuesday evening, immediate cause of death being pneumonia, which had developed only three days before his death.

Mr. Hales had made his home in Park City since he was eighteen years of age, and during his entire residence held the high esteem of all who knew him. He was always an honorable and useful citizen, a sincere friend, a courteous and obliging neighbor, and a man who endeavored always to perform every duty as a good citizen, and a devoted husband and father. Long will he be remembered by those who associated with him during his long residence in our midst.

Deceased was a native Utahn, being born in Peterson, Morgan county, on January 13, 1871—death claiming him on his 7ist birthday.


Mr. Hales' first employment in Park City was at the old Anchor mill in Empire canyon, and for two years was superintendent of the old Ontario mill, later succeeding James T. Kescel as superintendent of the Daly Judge and Park Utah mills, holding that position until two years ago, when he resigned because of poor health. Mrs. Hales died in this city seven years ago.

Surviving are two sons, Mont, of Salt Lake City, and Mansfield, for some years past a resident of Minnesota, and two sisters, Mrs. Richard Bailey and Mrs. George P. Stanley, both of Park City.

Funeral arrangements will not be made until the arrival of the son, Mansfield—and will be announced later.


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
